

Understanding Burnout

Burnout is a phrase often heard and indeed, research tells us that if asked to identify what burnout looks like, most adults will correctly name some of the symptoms. However, overall, it is sometimes a word thrown around without full understanding and the impact of that is poor recognition of serious signs and indicators leading to long term consequences.

Burnout is physical and emotional exhaustion and occurs when an individual has been exposed to long term stress, or a physically or emotionally demanding role over a period of time. Common signs of burnout include:

- Feeling tired or drained most of the time
- Feeling helpless, trapped and/or defeated
- Feeling detached/alone in the world
- Having a cynical/negative outlook

There are also stages to burnout; rather like a tide, it does tend to creep up on people and recognition that something is wrong doesn't happen until the issue becomes guite serious. Recovery from a full burnout is not as simple as having a period of time off work; to repair the physical, emotional and mental damage takes a considerable amount of time and a multi-faceted

To have knowledge as individuals and within an organisation is powerful; it becomes easier to identify concerns, hold structured conversations and plan for the right interventions before a person reaches the later






It can be within Cumbria or out of county; online or virtual offerings and paid or free learning opportunities.

It is an early intervention strategy with the aim of preventing any concerns a child might have developing into serious issues by providing the child with an adult whom they can simply chat to about whatever is on their mind.

1-2-1 LISTENING SERVICE

It's important to create an open environment where children and young people can talk about how they feel without judgement.'

HOW DOES IT WORK?

How does 1-2-1 Listening work in practice?

Trained volunteers are matched with schools in the local area and the pastoral staff at the school decide which children would benefit most from the service. The sessions are held in a quiet, calm place and last for approximately 20 - 30 minutes. After 'small talk', the volunteer uses 3 main questions:

- Out of all you have been saying, what is
- Is there anything you would like to do about it?
- · Now we are finishing, can you say how you are feeling?

The number of sessions a child has is mainly decided by the pastoral staff with some input from the volunteer. Client confidentiality is respected except when a disclosure is made, then everything is carried out in line with the school's Safeguarding Policy, which needs to be discussed with the volunteer prior to their first session.

> It is important to note that 1-2-1 Listening is not a counselling service and volunteers are not to give advice, other than signposting pupils when appropriate.

WHAT ARE THE **BENEFITS OF USING** 1-2-1 LISTENING?

1-2-1 Listening not only benefits a child's mental wellbeing it also helps to enhance their academic learning, as they go back to class better able to focus on the task in hand, rather than with the thoughts that were swirling around in their head still occupying valuable 'thought space'. 1-2-1 Listening also provides the children

with a tool to use throughout their lives.

This was demonstrated by a child in a school who didn't arrive for her third session. When she was tracked down and asked why she said she didn't need to go anymore because she

now knew what to do when something was worrying her!

'Those interviewed high<mark>ligh</mark>ted that listening and suppor<mark>t is one of their main</mark> m<mark>en</mark>tal health needs.
