Bats: a source of contention

Bats are a source of great contention.

On the one hand, they are protected under the Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981, and Churches are regarded by Natural England (formerly English Nature) as a suitable habitat for them.

On the other hand, there is a Movement Against Bats in Churches, with whom English Heritage are in sympathy, because of the potential damage to furnishings, etc.

This is a national problem and one which national authorities must resolve.
