Harvesting a brighter future

From Cumbria to Malawi

With your help, Christian Aid are continuing to support people in rural Malawi through the pigeon pea project. Back in March, a group of Christians from Cumbria travelled to Malawi to see the amazing impact your donation is having.

They met Bertha, a pigeon pea farmer. Bertha lives in Mwanza; the climate is hot and the rains are unpredictable. Some years there is simply not enough rain to grow the traditional maize crop.

The pigeon pea difference

The pigeon pea has many benefits. This hardy and nutritious cash crop can be sold to provide family income. It's high in protein, drought resistant, doesn't need fertiliser – in fact, its leaves make the soil more fertile – and the stems can be used for firewood. Nothing gets wasted.

Bertha has been able to significantly increase her yield, thanks to the training she received through Christian Aid's partner Nandolo Farmers Association of Malawi. Now she can sell her pigeon peas through a cooperative, and enjoy a three-fold increase in profit.

The difference this makes is life-changing. Bertha's new income will ensure that her children can go to secondary school, giving them opportunities and hope for the future. She also plans to buy a bike for her family to use; invaluable in rural Malawi where there is very little motorised transport.

Bertha asked us to thank people in the UK

for their support, and that God may bless you as your continued support helps others.

Unlocking potential in Zululand

Thanks to you, USPG is continuing to work with the Anglican Church of Southern Africa. Together, through the Church and Community Mobilisation Programme (CCMP), they're helping vulnerable communities in Zululand to thrive.

USPG partner, HOPE Africa (the social development arm of the Church of Southern Africa), has been working alongside community groups and church leaders to identify the agricultural needs within Zululand Diocese. Your donation will help fund the training through local parish churches that's already unlocking potential for the local people.

For example, during last summer in the Ekwandeni parish in Zululand, a core

group of 19 local people received training – then they established a community vegetable garden.

The training brought the older people and the youth of the parish together, and the impact of their work is being felt across the community.

The impact your gift is making

Parishes across Zululand have been able to purchase seeds, uniforms and fencing for their food gardens. Seventy clergy, including bishops and archdeacons representing over 15,000 people from across Zululand Diocese, have also been trained. They've enthusiastically picked up the challenge of how to implement the scheme in their local areas.

St. Christopher's is an outstation of St. Augustine's Church in Nquthu. Exciting progress been made in the parish. The church grounds are being used for gardening, and the church itself runs five soup kitchens that serve food and tea to 85 children before school each morning.

The vegetables grown in the church garden are being used for the soup kitchens; when the harvest is very good they sell some of the produce to generate income.
