Painting your Church

Introduction

Before commencing a paint contract it is always advisable to carry out careful investigations.

If the wrong paint is used, if a surface is not properly prepared, or if paint is applied to damp walls then blistering and flaking can occur and the life of the paint will be shortened and a new paint job required at more expense.



It is always worthwhile to consult your architect before undertaking redecoration of your Church.

Issues for consideration

The following issues require consideration and discussion with your architect and/or contractor:

- What is the sub-base (what is the surface being painted eg plaster what type? [new lime plaster requires 12 months to dry before it can be painted] cement? wood varnished/stained/painted?)
- Is this the original paint finish or has, for example, original distemper/emulsion been over painted in the past by oil or vinyl based paint?
- What preparation is going to be done (scraped, cleaned, etc.)? Does this accord with the manufacturer's recommended specification?
- What type of paint (manufacturer, type [e.g. emulsion, vinyl emulsion, eggshell, gloss, stain etc.], colour, specification). Please provide colour samples.
- Number of coats. e.g. primer undercoat topcoats? Does this fully accord with the paint manufacturer's recommended specification? If not, why not?
- How is the paint to be applied, e.g. brush, roller, or spray?
- Do any areas require special protection during painting, eg organ, altar?
- Will scaffolding be required to access higher levels?
- Has lime wash been considered as an alternative to paint?

Finally, don't forget: you need a faculty unless the Chancellor's guidelines state otherwise.
