



Stars and Sky

Last night we were out in the garden, ringing an old bell and clapping in support of the NHS. Above us stars peppered the darkness, competing with my son's flashing torch. We could see the Plough and Orion. Even in the noise, there was a moment of wonder as we contemplated the vastness of the night sky.

At the weekend we went for our daily walk. The children on their scooters, my husband on his bike. Lots had changed in the landscape since my last walk pre-isolation. Daffodils eagerly turned towards the sun, magnolias, cherry and plum

blossoms were unfurling pastel smudges against the sky. The sky itself felt bigger somehow, as if the expanse of blue was silently reminding us to look up and beyond ourselves, even as we dodged two metres round others.

Sky and stars invoke in me a kind of calm, a reminder that I am small, the universe is large and, despite my life's disruptions and disappointments, the world keeps turning. Somewhere underneath these thoughts is something deeper too, an understanding that I am not in control of this thing called life, a keener appreciation of my dependency. That in the suffering, I can lift my face to the sky and know God's there.

A long time ago, Abraham sat under a glittering night sky somewhere in Canaa. God had just told him that he would be father to a great nation, his descendants outnumbering the stars. Abraham was an old man by this time and had spent his life wandering, waiting for God to bring him to a new land. I think he must have wondered more than once if he was mad to have chosen to trust God. He was old, and still no sign of this 'promised land'. Could/should he trust God's most recent, laughable idea that an ancient old couple could be parents?

We know how the story rolls. Under the stars Abraham acknowledged the creator of the universe and he made a choice. Abraham, despite his doubts, chose to trust. He chose hope over despair. The future promise over the present situation. He said yes to God and God stepped into the gaps in his life, the place and space of suffering, breathing promise, hope and life.

So as you walk outside today, look up to the vastness of the sky. Tonight, look for the stars from your window. We don't know how all this is going to turn out. But God does, and with God all things are possible.

And so we say our 'yes' to God, and press on.
