A Harvest of Justice and Peace

Your generous gift will help to provide security and access to land that many Palestinians rely on to survive.

Over the next three years, the Bishop's Harvest Appeal will be supporting the work of Christian Aid in Israel and the Occupied Palestinian Territories (IOPT) and the Mother's Union in the Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC). You'll have the opportunity to follow their exciting work and see the difference your generosity will make to farmers seeking their fair share of the harvest.

Christian Aid's work in IOPT promotes human rights, peace-building and looks to develop mutual understanding in the region between different communities.

The Ecumenical Accompaniment
Programme (EAPPI) provides observers,
known as Ecumenical Accompaniers (EAs),
to monitor the interaction between the
Palestinian inhabitants of the West Bank and
East Jerusalem with the Israeli military. That
creates a protective presence and supports

Palestinians and Israelis working together for peace.

Many Palestinians rely on their land for their livelihoods. Shepherds in the West Bank can contact EAs to support their access to their agricultural land. In 2019, EAs supported shepherds on 404 recorded occasions and by being present at agricultural crossing points on 506 recorded occasions.

"If there is a confrontation, we will make sure we are visible, but we do not interact with settlers or soldiers unless someone directly asks us a question," an EA explains. "We are here, we see, and we document, and we often notice that it has a calming effect on the situations."

Supporting EAPPI is a practical way to promote peace and ensure that the fruit of the land is used for the common good.

Community transformation in the DRC

The Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC) is one of the poorest countries in the world. The ongoing violence between communities causes extreme poverty and cements gender stereotypes which contribute to the constant threat of sexual and physical violence against women.

Illiteracy is one of the biggest barriers faced by women and girls trying to escape poverty and break the cycles of gender-based violence. Mothers' Union's extensive experience of working in the DRC has highlighted the exceptional challenges they face in being to participate in the decision-making process at both community and household level. This lack of participation

creates a culture of ignorance; the feeling of being left behind; it exacerbates household and community poverty; and contributes towards gender abuse and violence. Because of this, Illiterate women cannot be leaders, they cannot be selected for training, and the general perception is that they cannot run a good business or become successful.

To combat this, Mothers' Union wants to start a Literacy and Agriculture programme throughout different areas in DRC. This programme will provide literacy and numeracy skills to 750 disadvantaged community members in the three dioceses. Each group of around 25 participants will be led by a voluntary community facilitator. who will receive training on how to start and manage literacy circles. Further training will follow concentrating on good practices in agriculture and setting up cooperatives, as well as training in basic business management skills. Groups will combine participatory literacy skills and methodology with agricultural good practices and techniques.

Lord of the harvest, grant all who work the land a safe harvest; and may they receive rich rewards for their labours. Inspire those of us with plenty to share with those who have little.
