FOR SUCH A TIME AS THIS

You know the feeling. Up against it with requests, demand and need coming from all sides, you seek to plant your feet firmly and make the next right decision, for your people, your children, your community. But the ground is constantly shifting, the needs shifting too. You're tired and you want some respite from the constant fire fight. Can't someone else do this? Just for a bit? But fending off the doubt and fatigue you stand anyway, take a breath and walk towards the door, readying yourself to try and work order out of chaos one more time. For you are here FOR SUCH A TIME AS THIS.

Drawn from the story of Esther, these are the words of Mordecai, Esther's Uncle. Esther is Queen, married to King Xerxes of Persia. She is also Jewish, although the King doesn't know this, and a decree has just gone out to annihilate the Jews. Mordecai entreats Esther to risk her life, to go to the King and plead for her people. 'Who knows?' Mordecai says to Esther, 'Perhaps you occupy your royal position for such a time as this.'

How did Esther fend off the doubt and fatigue, quell her fear and step towards sacrifice and suffering, her heart hammering in her chest? When I imagine Esther wrestling with the choice before her, grappling with her weakness ("Don't put your head above the parapet, it's not your job, someone else will do it") and finding courage ("Your people need you, only you can do this"), I imagine a moment of stillness and her whispering the words of the prophet Isaiah: 'The Spirit of God is on me, because the Lord has anointed me to preach good news to the poor. He has sent me to bind up the brokenhearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives and release from darkness the prisoners.' Then Esther stands, her royal bracelets jangling, and moves towards the door.

There is something you are being called to do. It is just for you to do, no-one else can do it. It is God's work. It is sacrificial. You will want not to do it. When you *are* doing it, you will want it to stop. At times you will wonder where God is – why isn't God showing up? You will feel lonely. Despondent. Angry. Tired. Like Jesus in the Garden before the crucifixion, you may cry.

Sometimes the stories only make sense in retrospect.

We are human and can only live in the here and now. In the moment we find ourselves, it can all seem so... WRONG. Unfair. Ugly. To endure can feel impossible. What can we lean on when God seems silent?

When all is said and done, there is a choice for each of us to make. Either God is there and has got this, or isn't, and doesn't. If the latter is true, then there is nothing to do other than lean on our own understanding. And because our nature is rather selfish, to preserve ourselves may then feel right. Sensible. Why would you willingly walk towards suffering?

If God is there, and God *has* got this (covid-19 and all), we are free to trust in God and God's plan. We don't have to have all the answers. This trust is not blind. We have a book full of the stories of those who chose to trust, and what happened when they made this choice. The Bible shows us, again and again, that good does come, and will come, when we choose to trust and step towards the sacrifice and suffering. Jesus chose crucifixion – the result was resurrection. Esther chose to risk her life and go to King Xerxes – the result was liberty for her people.

Hundreds of years after Esther, Jesus stood in the synagogue in his home town, and spoke these words to his community: "The Spirit of God is on me... the Lord has anointed me..." Jesus was chosen, and because of our identity in Jesus we are chosen too. We are chosen to serve and suffer for others, as Esther and Jesus did. Jesus, the pioneer of our faith, has trodden this path of struggle and suffering ahead of us. He gets it. He is waiting in the shadows of our doubt and our grief, our fear and exhaustion. He draws alongside us and says to us: 'You are chosen. Despite everything you may think to the contrary. Because you are mine, you are chosen, and you are chosen for such a time as this.'

So my prayer for us today is for courage, that we will step towards the sacrifices we are being asked to make, trusting that God will sustain us, redeem us and draw us to himself.

Trusting that God is at work, in us and through us.

Trusting that we are made FOR SUCH A TIME AS THIS.

SIAMS Update

We fully appreciate the relief that school staff have felt without the pressure of external inspection from either Ofsted or SIAMS to think about during such difficult times. We equally understand how frustrating it is not to have clarity about when inspections will resume and what they will look like.

We share your frustration. National guidance around SIAMS inspections is still awaited but is unlikely to be available until well into October. SIAMS inspections (under s.48) will remain suspended until inspections by Ofsted (under s.5) resume, as the two are linked. We do not yet have an official restart date (although we know that it will not be before January 2021). There is inevitably a backlog of inspections outstanding. We await information about scheduling to enable us to space out the inspections so that we are not under pressure to inspect a disproportionate number of schools every 5



years from the anniversary of the lockdown. We will keep you updated as soon as the position is confirmed to us.

Whether or not you are due to be inspected by SIAMS, do keep in mind that a huge amount of the work currently being undertaken feeds directly into the SIAMS schedule: mental health and wellbeing, recovery, hope, forgiveness, repairing relationships, and closing the gap between the most vulnerable or disadvantaged pupils and their peers. You are doing it naturally – remember to get the credit for it! Keep a note of everything you are doing and have put in place.

However, do remember that staff at school who watch your videos with the children can pause them and ask questions and invite responses so although it isn't the same as you actually being there, pupils still get lots out of it. St John's in the Vale and Rydal Hall

I was born and raised in Cumbria, but until this summer I had never visited St John's in the Vale Centre or Rydal Hall. Both have a rich history of connections with children and young people and in this season of bubbles, social distancing and a general heightened anxiety, SJVC and Rydal provide some much-needed balm for souls.

Driving up the track towards SJVC, I could feel the pressures of life slide from my shoulders a little. I



had to stop and take a photo: this really was the Lakes at their best. SJVC is tucked into a hillside, with ample space for children and young people to run, play or lounge around in the long grass with mates whilst ignoring attendant teachers. With a natural firepit and plenty of inside space, it wasn't long before ideas for fun, restorative away days for bubbles and staff were dancing round my head. Indeed, St. Herbert's school in Keswick have already taken advantage of all SJVC has to offer, using the centre as their base for a year 5 residential (pre-covid) which included outdoor adventure and geocaching, art workshops in the centre, campfires and a candlelit service held in the neighbouring church.

At Rydal, my children scampered hooting around the campsite and grounds whilst I toured



the site. Rydal is a hidden educational gem; there are so many ways a visit here can enrich the curriculum: from the science of the hydroelectric power generated on site, to the poetry of Wordsworth (who, tradition has it, sat in the Grot getting all inspired), to the Hall's history as host for an entire school evacuated from Liverpool during World War II. And all that before you get going with ways in which schools might use the grounds around the Hall for exciting outdoor adventures, or as a Duke of Edinburgh base.
