Vanessa's Reflection:



He has shown you, O man, what is good;
And what does the LORD require of you
But to do justly,
To love mercy,
And to walk humbly with your God?

[Micah 6:8, New King James Version]

The season of Lent is about spending time in our heart space; observing the cracks and seeking the vastness - like Jesus did in the wilderness. It's a time for contemplation, reconnecting us to the essence of who we are and who God is. It seems so simple.

But where is the time for this seeking,

contemplating, reflecting? Why is it that Lent is passing me by, again? Why haven't I given something up, or taken something up? How did it happen that we didn't do pancakes on Shrove Tuesday and that I missed the Ash Wednesday service? However much my heart craves hearing God's 'still small voice', the practises of Lent feel like another addition to a groaning to-do list. Is there a Lent hack?

In all the complexity, Micah cuts through with three simple, beautiful phrases. Act justly. Love mercy. Walk humbly with your God.

Perhaps this is the way Lent might work the metanoia-transformation in us this year. Perhaps Micah is inviting us to pause and ask, "How can I act justly right where I am, right now?" Or, "How can I love mercy, right where I am, right now?" Or "How can I walk humbly, right where I am, right now?"

And that is all that is required. It is enough to ask the questions. The Spirit will lead us to the rest.



SIAMS Update:

If you are expecting a SIAMS inspection (or an Ofsted inspection for that matter) in the near future, it is worth just having a think about the impact on any



groups of pupils who may be invited to speak to an inspector. We're really noticing the difference in pupil discussions in recent inspections.

Pupils have not been used to having visitors in school and talking to people they don't know about their school and their learning. For some it is a real treat and they are keen and excited to take part. But, for some, it can be daunting. In order that the inspection process is not a negative one for any of your pupils, you might want to consider inviting someone they don't know well (a new governor or a governor they haven't seen for a while perhaps) to chat to them so they are more at ease during an inspection. Your Diocesan link will be happy to conduct a pupil voice exercise when next visiting your school if this would be helpful.


Church Corner

This week: Season of Lent

Colour: Purple

Sunday 20th March: Third Sunday of Lent

The Gospel reading this Sunday is likely to be Luke 13:1-9. In the first part of the passage, Jesus seems to have been asked a question about two recent events; two groups of people upon whom great misfortune has fallen. The first event is unsuitable for young children.



Some "Galileans whose blood Pilate had mingled with their sacrifices" have been massacred by the Roman authorities, apparently while at worship, offering animal sacrifices in the Temple. Fortunately, the second instance is a bit more palatable. A tower in Siloam (just South of Jerusalem) has collapsed, killing 18 people. Someone seems to have asked Jesus a question along the lines "was God punishing these people for their evil deeds?"

Jesus' answer seems clear: whether it arises from human action or accident, evil and suffering is not sent by God as a punishment. He then redirects his listeners: stop worrying about what other people might or might not have done wrong. Worry about your own life. Accidents and other misfortunes may happen at any moment: repent of your own wrongs while you have the chance.

The second half of the passage, the Parable of the Fig Tree, is intended to emphasise this message. The fig tree is usually symbolic of both the nation of Israel and individual listeners. Jesus describes a tree that has been fruitless for three years. The gardener, representing Jesus, pleads for the tree to have one last chance, promising to dig plenty of manure in around it. God's patience is not infinite, but he has given us one more chance, in the shape of his son. The message of Jesus is timeless, the same as that of the Prophet Isaiah, whose 55th chapter is also likely to be read:

Seek the Lord while he may be found; call on him while he is near.

Let the wicked forsake their ways and the unrighteous their thoughts.

Let them turn to the Lord, and he will have mercy on them, and to our God, for he will freely pardon.

The services will take place at


Holy Trinity Church, Kendal:

Feedback from Headteachers: themes of the week

COVID: The recent surge in case numbers has elevated the pressure once again in schools. One school is only just back to having a full complement of staff after a challenging outbreak. In the main, supportive relationships exist between homes and schools around covid management, however there were some anecdotes about difficulties of managing situations where there is covid in a household and parents/carers tell school, 'We're testing every day', but the child later reveals they've never had a test or they've been 'testing' by sticking swabs in their ears!

Mothers Union: An interesting common symbol brought us to this conversation: a number of individuals on the call have a wee wool holding cross made and distributed by the Mother's Union. We had an interesting conversation about their work; some of us were not aware of the local work and global activism Mother's Union are engaged in, for example their campaigning against gender-based violence. Wellbeing Corner: Talking with Children about the Crisis in Ukraine

The terrible events unfolding in Ukraine and likewise, the human cost, has dominated our news and media for the last three weeks, and there is no, one, single person who cannot fail to be affected by what we are seeing unfold in front of our eyes. Should we remove the colour from the images of crowed train stations and terrified children, we might as well we back in the 1940s.

Unlike the 1940s and some of the other conflicts the world has known, this one carries the very real threat of nuclear war – something that strikes fear at the heart of everyone. For adults, this is very real, so how must it be to experience this situation through the lens of a child right now? It can be helpful to have places to go, both as a professional and a parent, to access reliable materials to explore the conflict with children and allow them to explore their thinking, and their questioning in a safe way.

The <u>BBC Children in Need</u> website has some useful materials for both teachers and parents on their website designed specifically for supporting children with conversations about what is happening in Ukraine. Under each heading, you will find access to relevant and reliable websites, each providing some high-quality resources and guidance.
