

Church Corner

This week: Season of Easter

Colour: White **Sunday:** 24th April



Almost all churches will be reading from the Acts of the Apostle each Sunday in Easter: the Lectionary insists on this. Acts generally replaces a reading from the Old Testament (the Hebrew Bible). This emphasises that, in the church (the Body of Christ) which God inaugurated after Easter, He was doing a completely 'new thing' (Isaiah 43:19). This week (Acts 5:27-32), Peter and some other apostles are hauled before the Temple authorities for teaching about Jesus. Now the Jesus movement has grown, they are take a defiant tone. The chief priests cannot take them by force, for fear of the same crowd which shouted 'hosanna' on Palm Sunday and 'crucify' on Good Friday (Acts 5:25-26).

The Gospel reading (<u>John 20:19-end</u>) tells the story of doubting Thomas. Children often hear this as a story critical of Thomas, but the other disciples (who believed straight away) had already seen Jesus in person when Thomas (who was absent) expressed his doubts. When he too sees Jesus, he too believes. Thomas is in just the same position as all of us: he has not seen, and is asked to believe on the basis of others' evidence. While we are not to judge poor Thomas, we <u>are</u> called to do better: to be those who are blessed because we "have not seen and yet have believed" (John 20:29). *ST*

To celebrate the Platinum Jubilee and as part of Thy Kingdom Come 2022, we have 500,000 free storybooks for primary school children. This small colourful book has a royal theme and is based on the Fruit of the Spirit - faithfulness. Faithfulness is like loyalty, trustworthiness and commitment rolled into one, and the Queen has set an excellent example of this. We are also providing assembly plans, activity packs, and take-home sheets for those that want them. The book is linked to one of the 5 animated TV episodes that we are providing to resource children and families this Thy Kingdom Come. These programmes have been produced by BBC animators to help children and families grow in their faith and learn about the bible in a format that will engage them most at a critical age for faith formation. Join hundreds of schools from around the world taking part in this year's Spirited Arts competition!

Winning entries will provide a good response to one of the 5 themes, and judges will be asking: Is it original? Is it well-crafted? And (most importantly!) Is it excellent RE?



How to enter?

Pupils can enter individually, in pairs or groups, or as whole class, year or school entries. We have also been pleased to receive entries from whole community groups on previous years.

All entries must be received before 31 July 2022.

Many schools host their own Spirited Arts competition and send their 10 winning entries in to our international competition. What a great way to engage all your teachers and pupils and raise the profile of RE in your school! To enable teachers to incorporate the art competition into their RE lessons, many schools have an 'Spirited Arts' unit of work, or a special learning RE/arts week.

Here are a few key things to remember:

- 1. If teachers are able to collate and send in their **10 best entries** (as usual), that would be a big help for us!
- 2. If this isn't possible due to social distancing policies, pupils can submit their own entries but they must include their NAME, AGE, SCHOOL NAME, SCHOOL POSTCODE and have the ARTWORK AND WRITE UP TOGETHER.
- 3. Entries must reach us before 31 July 2022 to be accepted.

DFE update: we are writing to you to tell you that we yesterday have just updated <u>content on the GOV.UK website offering guidance to schools, local authorities and parents on the rights of foreign nationals to access schools in England.</u>

It provides advice on:

- eligibility to enter the country to access a school;
- requirements for admission authorities in processing applications (i.e. requirements within the School Admissions Code and the law);
- advice on processing applications made from those living outside England but returning to live in England.

As you will be aware:

- all children living in the UK have a right to access a school in England irrespective of nationality or immigration status. This includes EEA nationals resident in the UK;
- schools must always apply their admission arrangements unless the fair access protocol is being applied (so, refugees from Ukraine, and migrants from Afghanistan and Hong Kong or asylum seekers from other countries receive no higher or lower priority for admission than other people living in the UK);
- school admission authorities should not delay admission to await information on a migrant's immigration status, home address or age. It is the responsibility of:
 - o parents to ascertain their UK entry terms, and those of their children, will not be breached by them taking up a state-funded school for their child. This is not the responsibility of the school, admission authority or local authority;
 - o local authorities to undertake age assessments where the age of a migrant child is uncertain;
- state-funded schools must not seek to recruit foreign nationals as pupils from outside the UK (Irish nationals aside).





Equally, if any of you would like to take this chance to adopt this Ofsted and SIAMS approved RE curriculum, scheme of work and assessment package, please do so.

The course, at the North Lakes Hotel, Penrith on Wednesday 19th October, will be tailored to Carlisle Diocese schools and you should feel free to ask any questions you may have.
