TOWARDS A BRIGHTER FUTURE

Your support of the Bishop's Harvest Appeal will help break the poverty cycle in the Occupied Palestinian Territories

Over the past years, the Bishop's Harvest Appeal has been supporting the work of Christian Aid in Israel and the Occupied Palestinian Territories (IOPT) and the Mothers' Union in the Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC).

Christian Aid's work in IOPT promotes human rights, peace-building and looks to develop mutual understanding in the region between different communities.

Education is highly valued among Palestinians, and huge numbers of men and women attend education right through to University. Yet Palestinians face some of the highest rates of unemployment in the world. Unemployment is particularly acute among young people and is rising among graduates, especially young women.

Palestinians who live in Gaza have lived under land, sea and air blockade for more than 15 years. The impact of this closure on the economy has been devastating. Christian Aid's partner the Women's Affairs Centre (WAC) is based in Gaza, and helps support women to develop ways around this to build their skills to achieve their potential.

Elham, 24, struggled to find any employment since graduating in 2020.

For Elham, an opportunity came up in a project funded by Christian Aid which was implemented by WAC with the aim to increase ICT skills and improve access to the current digital job market. This helps women to access markets outside the closed Gaza Strip, which is an innovative response to the particular needs of Gaza residents. The project delivered a comprehensive training, with those enrolled receiving 190 hours of teaching, including graphic design, and coaching on working online as a freelancer.

"Job and volunteer opportunities are almost non-existent," Elham said. "I saw WAC's application form to join the freelance training program. I was thrilled when WAC called me to join the program after passing the technical exam and personal interviews". She added "I will never forget the trainers and coaches and their tremendous efforts, invaluable coaching, neverending support, and unwavering commitment to our achievement. They helped me get a lot of projects via various freelancing platforms. I will never forget my feeling when I got my first freelance job."

By utilizing the knowledge and skills gained from the freelance training program, she has successfully gained over \$2,200 through different freelancing platforms and social media sites and has maintained a short-term contract with a monthly salary of \$280. Elham said, "I express my gratitude and appreciation to WAC and Christian Aid for the generous support they gave us."

The Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC) is one of the poorest countries in the world. The ongoing violence between communities causes extreme poverty and cements gender stereotypes which contribute to the constant threat of sexual and physical violence against women.

Illiteracy is one of the biggest barriers faced by women and girls trying to escape poverty and break the cycles of gender-based violence. Mothers' Union's extensive experience of working in the DRC has highlighted the exceptional challenges they face in being to participate in the decision-making process at both community and household level. This lack of participation creates a culture of ignorance; the feeling of being left behind; it exacerbates household and community poverty; and contributes towards gender abuse and violence.

Through literacy, numeracy and agricultural learning circles, 86% of the participants are now literate. One of the participants, Marceline from Kindu diocese, was never able to attend school, but thanks to the literacy and numeracy circles, she is able to utilize her skills in her tailoring business.

"I was making all the clothes without knowing how to read and write, and it made my job very difficult. When the project of literacy started in our area, I enrolled quickly. I thank God for this project, I am attending every day, and I am able to read all my messages on my telephone if my clients write to me. My life has greatly improved."

In addition, she has recruited a second person in her newly opened workshop and used some of the income to repair her mum's house and pay for her brother's school tuition.

With your help, the literacy groups can continue, and new savings groups can be established in order to enhance and create new businesses. This will improve the economic situation of the families, and the community as a whole and help reduce sexual and physical violence against women.
