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#### Reflection:

This week's reflection is coming to you at the end of a long day at a Flourishing Leaders session in sunny Birmingham. As many of you know, there are days when I simply despair of our education system. It just feels like the expectations are unachievable; the funding and resources woefully lacking; and the support available dwindling by the second. It all seems too far gone and impossible to fix.

Today, as well as sharing the challenges we face in Carlisle Diocese, I have also been inspired to swap my 'scarcity' mindset for an 'abundance' mindset – ask me more about this next time you see me!

We've been reflecting on the best way to protect our precious schools. It was recognised that 'non grouped' rural primary schools are the most vulnerable natinally. Yet, they are often the last civic institution left in our communities and need a protective structure around them. We heard some wonderful examples of how joining together in formal collaborations can be, not just the saving of schools which would otherwise close, but the means to flourishing for pupils and staff in those schools - sharing the workload, increased capacity, no more 'undoable jobs'.

We have a lot of work ahead of us as a diocese but today, I was reminded to ask myself, 'if not you, then who?'

And so, instead of focussing on the scarcity or insuperable barriers we face as a diocesan family, I am choosing to feel hopeful that, together, we can support one another to flourish.



## Early Years discussion with Dr Julian Grenier

In <u>this episode</u> of Mind The Gap, Jon Hutchinson and Emma Turner are joined by Julian Grenier, a leading expert in early years education. Together, they discuss the foundations of early childhood learning, focusing on the crucial role of relationships and the development of coherent, supportive environments for young learners. Julian emphasizes the need for consistency in early years curricula, saying, "If we can get it right from the very beginning, we can set children on a much stronger trajectory." The trio also explore the challenges faced by educators in the early years and the importance of community engagement in supporting children's development. Finally, Julian shares insights from his work on the Early Years Foundation Stage and his thoughts on fostering professional development in early education.











## Improving school attendance

# Working together to improve school attendance

New Department for Education <u>statutory guidance</u> has been published relating to the important issue of school attendance.

Part of the summary to the main document explains that "this guidance should be read alongside the statutory guidance documents on children missing education, supporting pupils with medical conditions at school, education for children with health needs who cannot attend school, suspensions and exclusions, alternative provision, and Keeping Children Safe in Education" meaning that new expectations need to sit within these existing provisions, and need to be included within training offers/CPD for leaders, governors and other staff.

The new guidance, just issued in August 2024, has been updated to:

- Be clearer on the link between improving attendance and wider school culture, including the importance of working in partnership with families to find supportive routes to improve attendance.
- Reflect changes to the law on keeping school attendance and admission registers including a revised set of codes, granting leaves of absence and access to, and sharing of, attendance information introduced through the School Attendance (Pupil Registration) (England) Regulations 2024.
- Set out the new National Framework for issuing penalty notices and reflect changes to the law introduced through the Education (Penalty Notices) (England) (Amendment) Regulations 2024.
- Change 'parenting contracts' for attendance to 'attendance contracts' to better reflect the agreement between parents, schools and/or local authorities.



Expectations of both schools and local authorities have been updated.

Attendance codes have changed, as have arrangements for the enactment of penalty notices. This <u>video</u> from <u>School Business Services</u> explains these changes.

## School Clerk UK

The role of clerk (or governance professional) to our governing boards is an incredibly important one, Clerks deserve to be recognised, and developed, in the same way all our governors do. In a forthcoming edition of Weekly Comms we will be collating resources that may be useful to clerks and governance professionals – please make sure your clerks are signed up for the distribution list. The <a href="School Clerk UK blog">School Clerk UK blog</a> explains recent developments in the way clerks are recognised on GIAS along with boards:

#### "Update your records: add your governance professional details on GIAS

Schools and trusts can now add their governance professional details to the Get Information About Schools (GIAS) platform. This is not a mandatory requirement, but the DfE is strongly encouraging institutions to add their governance professional's details. This will allow the DfE to communicate directly with governance professionals and share key information, rather than relying on schools or chairs to pass news along."
