For clerks and governance professionals

The following "HOT TOPIC" on **Processing New Appointments: What Governance Professionals Need to Know** has been taken from the weekly newsletter of the National Association of School and College Clerks:



"When processing new non-executive directors (Trustees or Governors and even Members), remember that the term of office starts from the date of appointment—whether by election, Member resolution, or Board approval—not when preappointment checks are completed. To stay compliant and maintain momentum:

 Request DBS ID documents within 14 days of the individual agreeing to take on the role.

- Submit the DBS application promptly, and log that the outcome may affect eligibility under your Articles.
- Don't delay appointment for DBS clearance if your meetings are virtual or after-school hours
 with no pupil contact—but ensure they are not invited to any in-school activity where pupils
 are present until clearance is confirmed.

With many DBS results coming back in under a week, the risk of delay is low—but make sure you're logging everything clearly and updating your records swiftly."

In the case of Foundation Governors, who are appointed by the Diocese Board of Education, this means that the *appointment date* is the date of PCC approval of the person's nomination. This is to ensure that all the dates of publicly recorded documents tie together and help us fulfil our 'Safer Recruiting' responsibilities.

It is possible for schools to then arrange a start date to suit their own contexts if they wish.





Early Years discussion with Dr Julian Grenier

In <u>this episode</u> of Mind The Gap, Jon Hutchinson and Emma Turner are joined by Julian Grenier, a leading expert in early years education. Together, they discuss the foundations of early childhood learning, focusing on the crucial role of relationships and the development of coherent, supportive environments for young learners. Julian emphasizes the need for consistency in early years curricula, saying, "If we can get it right from the very beginning, we can set children on a much stronger trajectory." The trio also explore the challenges faced by educators in the early years and the importance of community engagement in supporting children's development. Finally, Julian shares insights from his work on the Early Years Foundation Stage and his thoughts on fostering professional development in early education.











Improving school attendance

Working together to improve school attendance

New Department for Education <u>statutory guidance</u> has been published relating to the important issue of school attendance.

Part of the summary to the main document explains that "this guidance should be read alongside the statutory guidance documents on children missing education, supporting pupils with medical conditions at school, education for children with health needs who cannot attend school, suspensions and exclusions, alternative provision, and Keeping Children Safe in Education" meaning that new expectations need to sit within these existing provisions, and need to be included within training offers/CPD for leaders, governors and other staff.

The new guidance, just issued in August 2024, has been updated to:

- Be clearer on the link between improving attendance and wider school culture, including the importance of working in partnership with families to find supportive routes to improve attendance.
- Reflect changes to the law on keeping school attendance and admission registers including a revised set of codes, granting leaves of absence and access to, and sharing of, attendance information introduced through the School Attendance (Pupil Registration) (England) Regulations 2024.
- Set out the new National Framework for issuing penalty notices and reflect changes to the law introduced through the Education (Penalty Notices) (England) (Amendment) Regulations 2024.
- Change 'parenting contracts' for attendance to 'attendance contracts' to better reflect the agreement between parents, schools and/or local authorities.



Expectations of both schools and local authorities have been updated.

Attendance codes have changed, as have arrangements for the enactment of penalty notices. This <u>video</u> from <u>School Business Services</u> explains these changes.

The School Clerk UK blog explains recent developments in the way clerks are recognised on GIAS along with boards:

"Update your records: add your governance professional details on GIAS

Schools and trusts can now add their governance professional details to the Get Information About Schools (GIAS) platform. This is not a mandatory requirement, but the DfE is strongly encouraging institutions to add their governance professional's details. This will allow the DfE to communicate directly with governance professionals and share key information, rather than relying on schools or chairs to pass news along."
